GOING HOME WITH A HEIMLICH VALVE

EXPECTED DATE OF DISCHARGE	• Be prepared to be discharged home by 10:00 am
NUTRITION	<ul> <li>No restrictions. Follow Canada's Food Guide to Healthy Eating for a balanced diet</li> <li>Avoid constipation by eating foods high in fibre (whole grain breads and cereals, fresh vegetables and fruit) and drinking plenty of fluids</li> </ul>
ΑCTIVITY	<ul> <li>DO NOT SMOKE.</li> <li>Do not lift greater than 5 to 10 pounds for 3 to 4 weeks after your surgery</li> <li>Do not go swimming while the chest tube is in</li> <li>After 3 to 4 weeks, resume <i>normal activities</i> as tolerated unless specified by your doctor</li> </ul>
PAIN MEDICATION	<ul> <li>You may be given a prescription for pain medication. Take as directed.</li> <li>Read all instructions for taking your medications and possible side effects</li> </ul>
HYGIENE	<ul> <li>You may shower with a waterproof dressing over the chest tube, insertion site and the valve. Put a piece of saran wrap over the tube, site and valve. Tape all the edges down to keep the water out.</li> <li>Do not put the Heimlich valve directly into water. Do not obstruct the tip of the valve that is open to air.</li> <li>Do not soak in a bathtub or hot tub while the chest tube is in or until your incisions are healed.</li> <li>Do not put lotions, powders, or any ointment on the chest tube insertion site.</li> </ul>
DRESSINGS	<ul> <li>Keep dressing on the site as dry as possible</li> <li>If there is drainage from the valve, gauze can be wrapped around the end of the valve</li> <li>Empty sputum bottle at the end of the valve as needed</li> </ul>
OTHER	• Home care will be arranged prior to your discharge from the hospital for Heimlich Valve care, management, and teaching
FOLLOW UP	<ul> <li>Follow-up visits with your doctor may be weekly or every other week. A chest x-ray will be done to make sure your lung remains expanded</li> <li>Make an appointment to see your doctor as directed in weeks.</li> </ul>

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## CONTACT YOUR DOCTOR OR GO TO THE EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT IF:



- 1. The chest tube falls out, tape gauze tightly to your skin covering where the chest tube went in, then go to the Emergency department immediately
- 2. The heimlich valve comes loose. Reattach it right away. Then call your doctor.
- 3. You have a sudden onset of sharp chest pain with shortness of breath
- 4. You have increased tenderness or pain that doesn't go away with pain medication
- 5. You have signs of infection:
  - Increased redness or warmth at the chest tube insertion site
  - Pus-like drainage
  - Large amounts of swelling or bleeding
  - Temperature (by mouth) greater than 38 C or 100.4 F for two readings taken 4 hours apart
